The XYZ Affair

After Washington's retirement, Thomas Jefferson wrote that the former "president is fortunate to get off just as the bubble is bursting, leaving others to hold the bag." This "bubble" was the **Jay Treaty** and it would prove to be a significant problem for John Adams.

Washington signed the "Jay Treaty" to keep peace between Britain and the United States. This treaty, however, angered France. The French navy began attacking American merchant ships bound for Britain. Many Federalists called for President Adams to declare war while the Republicans wanted Adams to **negotiate** (talk) with France. Adams needed to decide whether to agree with his own party and declare war or side with the Republicans and try to negotiate with France.

If we were Adams, we would...because...




John Adams decided to **defy** (go against) his own party, the Federalists, by negotiating with France. John Adams sent **diplomats** (negotiators) to France with the goal of creating a peace treaty. Upon arrival, three French ambassadors, nicknamed "X", "Y", and "Z", greeted the American diplomats. They asked for **bribes** (money) in order to start negotiations. The American diplomats gave them bribes but France still refused to negotiate. Instead, they kept attacking The United States.

This embarrassing story eventually made its way back to the American public. Angry Federalists wrote letters to Adams, pushing for war while angry Republicans thought Adams was a fool for giving France bribes. Adams **persisted** (kept trying) with negotiations even though France kept attacking American ships. Over the next two years, the United States was in a "**Quasi War**" (half war) with France because Adams did not fight back to French attacks.

If Adams had declared war, he could have increased his popularity with his own Federalist party. However, Adams thought this could ruin the nation. By siding with Jefferson, Adams' popularity decreased and he eventually lost re election.

The Alien & Sedition Acts

At first, President Adams tried to work closely with Vice President Jefferson. However, "party violence," Adams said, made such efforts "useless." Jefferson had begun printing fake news about Adams to make him look bad. When Adams found out, he wrote that Jefferson's "soul [was] poisoned with **ambition** [desire of power]." The two broke off their friendship for many years.

Adams was also worried about how easily manipulated Americans were by foreign diplomats. Many Americans had rioted in the streets against the respected George Washington simply because a French diplomat named "Citizen Genet" convinced them to. As a result, John Adams and the Federalist Congress decided that something must be done to limit the influence of foreign diplomats and fake news.


If we were Adams, we would...because...



The Federalist Congress and John Adams signed "The Alien and Sedition Acts" into law. The Sedition Act made **sedition**—encouraging rebellion against the government—a crime. Its definition of sedition included "printing, writing, or speaking in a scandalous or **malicious** [hateful] way against the government ... or the President." In reality, however, John Adams used this law to imprison journalists. Some of these journalists had printed fake news but many were simply critical of Adams without lying. Many Americans were outraged and saw this as a horrible violation of the first amendment.

The Alien Acts were aimed at **aliens** (noncitizen immigrants), like "Citizen Genet" and did two major things. First, it allowed the president to **deport** (remove) immigrants who were suspected of stirring up trouble. Second, it increased the time it took for an immigrant to become a **citizen** (someone who can vote). Usually it would take 5 years for an immigrant to become a voting citizen. Instead, The Alien Acts made immigrants wait 14 years before they were allowed to cast a ballot and vote. Coincidentally, most immigrants supported Republicans. By lengthening the time it took for immigrants to be allowed to vote, Adams tried to take potential votes away from Jefferson in the next election.
